















## Legend/Guide

	<p>Primary Designated Evacuation Shelter</p> <p>A facility to which people evacuate when they have lost their homes or other property due to damage caused by a disaster and are no longer able to live there, or when there is a risk of damage.</p>
	<p>Secondary Designated Evacuation Shelter</p> <p>Evacuation shelters that are opened when primary designated evacuation shelters exceed their capacity.</p>
	<p>Welfare Evacuation Shelter</p> <p>Evacuation shelters that are opened for disaster victims who have difficulty living in designated evacuation shelters.</p>

	<p>Disaster Prevention Emergency Radio Broadcasting System</p> <p>A system that broadcasts emergency information and plays sirens via outdoor loudspeakers installed throughout the city.</p>

## What to know when evacuating

### ● Important points for safe evacuation

- ① Evacuate in groups whenever possible
- ② Don't be fooled by unconfirmed information
- ③ Keep emergency supplies you carry with you to a minimum
- ④ Beware of downed power lines
- ⑤ Do not place furniture or other belongings on the road
- ⑥ Before evacuating, check the source of the fire again
- ⑦ Avoid narrow roads, riverbanks, cliffs, and being next to walls.
- ⑧ Once you arrive at the evacuation shelter, avoid acting selfishly, cooperate with other evacuees around you, and think about what you can do to help.
